The Water Conservation Patch (WCP) provides Girl Scouts with an opportunity to learn about and engage in water conservation activities.




Figure 1. The Water Conservation Patch consists of three documents with easy to follow instructions.

How the Water Conservation Patch Works

The WCP consists of two steps. First, girls are given a list of behaviors that may provide opportunities for water conservation and are asked to observe themselves and family members to determine if they engage in these activities. This step helps them to become aware of ways that they could easily be more water efficient. In the second step, girls choose one or more ways that they could conserve water. The number of activities chosen to earn the patch depends on their Girl Scout level (determined by age and school grade). The girls then conduct one or more selected activities and/or implement a technological retrofit as indicated on the Step 2 form. When the girls complete their patch activities, their troop leader mails the completed Step 1 and Step 2 forms to the WSP program coordinator who then mails the physical patches to the troop leader who awards them to the girls. The program was developed in consultation with Karen Cunha, Girl Scouts–Arizona Cactus-Pine Council, Inc., Program Specialist, Girl **Program.**
